
When Will Guidara, the author of *Unreasonable Hospitality*, was only 26 years old, he took over a brasserie in New York

Voting For Veterans

In just a few days, citizens (hopefully vetted ones that are actually walking around and not previously thought to be deceased) are going to cast their vote in one of the strangest and snarkiest presidential elections in American history.

It was cold, and the Iraqis had set the date for the

first true election since 1958. There had been various socialist dictators that had "show elections," prior to Saddam, and Saddam himself had two. In the first, he claimed a

99% vote in his favor, and the second boasted a 100% unanimous vote that served to "re-elect" him.

Enter our veterans, and those of the Coalition that had gone to Iraq to help. Due to the fact that Radwaniyah was an intel base, it was almost exclusively populated by Americans, with the exception of some elite forces that served to protect the perimeter. Here is where I saw something that changed my life forever. As it pertained to our soldiers, I saw guys put their lives on the line so that complete strangers had the chance to vote. It was a long, long day. There was bloodshed; thankfully not much, but I made coffee for the guys when they came in. It was a moment of celebratory tiredness.

As far as the Iraqis were concerned, Al-Zarqawi had promised to kill any who dared defy Al-Qaeda and vote. He managed to take the lives of a little over 45 Iraqis. Some had purchased their coffins in case they didn't make it through the day, and a 96-year-old woman voted for the first time. She was brought to the polling place in a wheelbarrow. "Blood and treasure" took on a whole new meaning, and I want to finish this **Soldier** by asking a question as it pertains to our troops:

Who, in your mind will lead and inspire our troops as Commanderin-Chief to manifest this kind of selflessness, and when they do, who will protect THEM? Once you have your answer, then vote for that person on November 5. And, while you're at it, pray that we will never have to have soldiers protect *US* while we "fill in the bubble" on our ballots.




Every year, mayors of cities from fifteen S.E. states get together for a couple of days to talk shop, exchange ideas, find out what's working and what's not, and ask for ideas. Mayor Ronnie was just back from the League of Municipalities' annual meeting, and this year it was held in Greenville, South Carolina. He described the city as "gorgeous," and in fact, provided the title for this installment: "A bucket list city."

The first thing that stood out to Mayor Ronnie was that there was no trash anywhere to be seen in Greenville, at least anywhere he walked. Anyone who knows the mayor knows that trash drives him wild, and cleaning up Athens is a high priority, always.

"Everyone's concerns were the same," said the



mayor. He went on to say that topics were as varied as IT and cybersecurity to drugs and trafficking. As always, public safety was at the very top of the list, and a city in West Virginia brought some hope to the issue of police dealing with incidents connected to citizens afflicted with mental illness. They have specially trained social workers that go on ride-alongs with police officers, and they work in tandem to diffuse situations where mental health is a factor. The mayor mentioned that at first the patrol officers were completely opposed to the idea, and for good reason. People who are untrained could certainly complicate already complicated situations that might involve drugs, mental illness, or both. However, over time it became apparent that this was a good idea, and now the officers are solidly behind it. We are looking into this," said the mayor, and went on to describe how helpful



this program had been.

Another topic was dealing well with town hall meetings that had the potential to become uncivil without much provocation. This presentation was entitled, "Taming the Town Hall: Simple Strategics for Productive Public Discourse." We talked at length about the need in our culture for the restoration of civility, and the fact that civility is powerful. Seeing as the South is well known for hospitality and good manners, that restoration would be more than welcome. The subject might be a topic for a future installment, and there's much to be said on it.

One of the things that Greenville has done beautifully is clear up its waterways. There were blighted buildings, dirty water, broken streets and roads, and with persistence, that area now is one of the crown jewels of Greenville. There is a road that has been converted into a suspended bridge walkway, where before it had become "the road to nowhere."

The mayor mentioned the fact that everyone present felt energized by the fact that they were all facing the same concerns, and troubleshooting together was encouraging. The mayor came home with ideas that can help make Athens a "bucket list city." "We have to be 'we' and we have to have a vision to keep moving no matter what," said the mayor.

So we prayed to that end, and once again it was time for Ronnie to roll.

Patriotic Events At The Museum

The Alabama Veterans Park is beautiful, and we invite everyone to join us for the ribbon-cutting ceremony Saturday, Nov. 2 at 9 a.m. directly after Coffee Call, our free breakfast for veterans and their families on the first Saturday of the month at 8 a.m. It is an enjoyable time for food and fellowship. There are other events taking place at the museum the following weekend.

On Thursday, Nov. 7, the museum will host the Alabama Mountain Lakes Tourist Association's inaugural Patriot Trail In Honor Of Veterans Celebration from 8-10 a.m. Featured speakers will be Sam Heflin, mayor of Priceville, AL, and Major General Janet Cobb, Executive Director U.S.S. Alabama Battleship Memorial Park. The N. AL. Patriot Trail honors and celebrates our veterans as it highlights museums, parks, memorials, and events in the North Alabama region. Several of the sites are close enough to visit in one day, perfect for fall outings with the family.

Athens State University will once again hold its Veterans Day program at the Alabama Veterans Museum on Friday, Nov. 8 at 11 a.m. The featured speaker will be Major General Frank J. Lozano, Program Executive Officer Missiles and Space at Redstone Arsenal. He is responsible for the development, production, fielding, sustainment, and international program as-



pects for assigned missile and space systems. MG Lozano assumed his current position in August 2022.

MG Lozano graduated from Texas A&M University in 1993 and commissioned as a second Lieutenant in the Armor Branch. He served as a Platoon Leader, Executive Officer, Cavalry Squadron Staff Officer and Calvary Troop Commander, before transitioning into the Army Acquisition Corps in 2001. He graduated with a MBA from the University of Texas at Arlington and served with Lockheed Martin Missiles and Fire Control in Grand Prairie, TX, in 2002 as part of the Training With Industry (TWI) program.

After completion of Command and General Staff College, MG Lozano was assigned as the Assistant Product Manager for Project Manager Soldier Weapons, PEO Soldier, followed by an assignment as an Ammunition and Demolition System Acquisition Manager for the Special Operations Command (SOCOM) and the Army Research **Development** and Engineering Command (RDECOM).

In 2008, MG Lozano was assigned as a Department of the Army System Coordinator (DASC) for Tactical Missile Systems and Ballistic Missile Defense Systems. He was subsequently selected to be the Special Assistant for the Army's Vice Chief of Staff. In his position as the Special Assistant, he provided insight, advice, and counsel on Army acquisition programs crossing many different functional capability areas.

MG Lozano commanded the Product Management Office for Soldier Protective Equipment, PEO Soldier from 2011 until 2014. From 2014 to 2016 he was assigned to the Joint Staff, J-8 Capabilities and Acquisition Division. Upon graduation from the U.S. Army War College, he assumed the position of Project Manager for the Lower Tier Project Office, PEO Missiles and Space from 2017 until 2020, followed by an assignment as the Integrated Fires and Rapid Capability Office PM. He was then assigned as the ASA (ALT) Chief of Staff from 2021 to 2022.


MG Lozano's operational

and combat experience include deployments to Bosnia, Kuwait, and Iraq. His awards and decorations include the Parachutist Badge, Ranger Tab, Legion of Merit, Bronze Star Medal, Joint Service Commendation Medal, the

Welcome to our crew!

"How will we ever get home?!" one of my precious passengers cried, with big tears welling up in her wide brown eyes. With only 11 students left on board towards the end of our route, we drove upon a wreck so fresh that the occupants were just coming out of their damaged vehicles that were, unfortunately, blocking both directions of traffic on the dangerous curvy road.

My heart ached for the young lady who, once she got out, had just collapsed in the road, all alone, with her head in her hands as she was obviously upset and in shock. In my heart

of hearts, I wanted to run and check on her. I wanted to see if she was okay, call her mom, comfort her, explain what shock was, and stay with her until a family member or the ambulance arrived to help her through the next overwhelming and complicated steps. We have all been there. But my allegiance as bus captain was to stay with my yellow ship and comfort my precious cargo tucked inside. There was no danger to us, so I didn't have to execute the 'evacuation' plan, yet we were so very stuck with no way forward and a winding road behind us.

Calling in the wreck over the county radio to the school was the first thing I did so parents could be notified and other buses that run this street could find an alternate route. My job now was to keep the kids calm. I explained that the wreck was not serious, and all involved seemed to be



okay as they awkwardly waited for the police and paramedics to arrive. A few kids were still very worried as this may have been the first ever wreck that they were front row seat to. After trying many ways to talk through and comfort, I finally asked, "Does anyone know how to pray?" Lil Momma K immediately responded, "I do." I encouraged that line of action for anyone who felt comfortable to do so, for the people we saw hurting before us being played out like a bad movie through our windshield big screen TV. My man L piped up and added, "I can pray, but only in my head." I said,

"Alright, go." Immediately he interlocked his young fingers and bowed his head, silently praying so hard his eyes were tightly squinted shut.

My older kids quietly comforted the younger ones by holding a hand or whispering encouragement with gentle and kind words about getting home soon. By this time, onlookers and concerned neighbors were caring for those involved. At this point, others were showing up to help this stranded bus get these babies safely home. Several volunteers helped us by walking alongside our bus, creeping along in reverse,

making a safe path to a driveway wide enough to back into and turn around. With the generous help of random strangers, we were free! Although we were all so very relieved, I knew the kids were affected by the 'trauma' of the situation except for Sweet & Sassy J who miraculously slept peacefully through the entire thing. 'Brown Eyes' stayed teary and at her stop, dramatically ran into her grandmother's arms to release the rest of her tears. Luckily, all parents were alerted to our sticky situation and expressed thankful gratitude for getting their frightened bus baby home safely. One parent claimed that I was the 'Best Bus Driver Ever.' As sweet as that was, and I won't deny her right to claim that. I feel I just did what any other bus driver would do.

Lord, thank you for Your safety and provisions through the generosity of others. Amen!



Heat oven to 350 degrees.


Combine shredded turnips and 1 diced apple. Add brown sugar and salt and mix well.

Sliding Into Growth

WHOOAA...OW!" thought to myself as I painfully skidded to a halt on the grippy rubber mat. At least I think I thought that to myself; it's all kind of a blur. I remember shooting down the slide, a bit of airtime, then a hard landing. I realized that my dress wasn't where I had tucked it at about the same time I saw two honored elders sitting on a bench six feet away. I scrambled to prevent any evidence of wardrobe malfunction and apologized with as much grace as a 53-year-old woman launching out of a metal tube with her untucked dress could muster.

"You're fine, nothing showed," laughed one of the gentlemen, and the other seconded his assessment. I think they were just being polite because I felt a very definite rubber mat burn distressingly high on the back of one leg...but plausible deniability is a wonderful thing to preserve the idea of dignity when actual evidence of such is lacking.

I was at Discovery Park in Union City, Tennessee for the Rural Tour-Conference. You might have seen in the paper back in June that we (Athens-Limestone County Tourism) won the bid to host the 2025 conference when we, along with Chamber, LCEDA, Main Street, and the mayor, presented at Tuscaloosa against two other great organizations.

This a huge deal for us as an office and as a county. The host community arranges hotels, venues, food, entertainment, shopping, speakers, and more. The 200-300 guests get a chance to visit other areas, shop at our stores, eat our amazing cuisine, learn new ways, and share struggles.

Regardless of location, rural tourism generally shares the same difficulty: funding. Large counties with big venues and attractions such as theme parks, large convention centers, zoos, and beaches have very little trouble proving their tourism worth and get budgets to bring in more.

However, in smaller communities where there are no built-in attractions, the struggle is real. You need tourists to bring in funding for the county, which provides money for roads, schools, and services. You need funding to bring in tourists. Tourism in Limestone County brings in \$55 million a year (yes, that is correct), but because the tourists are coming in ones and twos, and shop, eat, and browse individually. It is difficult to see what we do and what we can do in the future with a few brave decisions.

But let's look at Union City...

Union City, where we

visited, is a town of 11,000 people in a county of 30,000 people. In comparison, Athens has a population the same as their whole county! And Limestone County has a population of 110,000!

But they have Discovery Park, which welcomes 250,000 visitors each year. I had no idea the key to turning me back into an 8-year-old girl was simply walking through the doors. I went high in the air and stood on a glass floor 13 stories up. I held onto a rail as a room shook in an earthquake simulation. I climbed through a tunnel to pop up in a polycarbonate observation bubble, face-to-face with a mildly bored catfish.

We had free rein of the entire park, and it was glorious! Room after room of history and science and space and cars and every cool thing! And I didn't even tour outside!

Now, this is where the tourism professional in me kicks in: Imagine the revenue from those visitors eating, sleeping, shopping, buying fuel. The park provides jobs. The park provides documentable proof of tourism. The park provides mightily for the city and county and for quality of life for the residents. We need something like that here

But I am careful with progress-not all progress is good, and my job is to watch out for my fellow citizens and improve their quality of life. I looked at "250K" and thought, "Would that negatively impact Limestone County in some way? Would this make a ton of traffic and congestion and strain?" I don't want that for me or for

But breaking down the numbers, that's just an extra 685 people per day. Fiddlers Convention brings in 10 thousand people over the course of 3 days, and the only traffic impact was around the university, which is right in town on narrow streets. A venue that is just outside of town wouldn't even have that tiny bit of headache.

If we got a venue that would host just 250,000 people per year (for comparison, the Von Braun 10,000 Center seats people at one time), and those people spent a mere \$100 in Limestone County, that is an extra \$25,000,000 per year! That money goes to us directly (shops, restaurants, etc.) and indirectly (roads, tax savings, etc.).

Why am I bringing this up? Because we need to invest wisely in the future of our community. We are past the point of relying mostly on passive tourism to fund us. We can, wisely, draw people in, provide them with an excellent experience, then use the revenue they provide to better our future. We need something, even if it isn't another Discovery Park (though if we do get a big slide, I'll make sure to wear shorts under my dress).



change, they are adept at managing day-to-day operations and addressing immediate challenges. They concentrate on preserving established processes, minimizing risks, and ensuring compliance with existing standards. This leadership style can be invaluable during periods of stability or when organizations require consis-

tent results and conservative decision-making. However, during times of rapid change or when innovation is necessary, caretaking leadership may fall short in guiding an organization through new ventures.

A more fitting name for the concept of caretaking leadership might be "sustaining leadership." This term captures the essence of this leadership style, emphasizing the importance of sustaining and managing existing systems to ensure stability and reliability. Sustaining leadership conveys a sense of stewardship and responsibility for maintaining continuity within an organization, highlighting the role of leaders who prioritize consistency and reliability in operations. By focusing on preservation and effective management, sustaining leaders provide

a steady foundation that supports organizational health and performance over time.

Both visionary and caretaking leadership styles have their strengths and applications, depending on the needs and context of an organization. Visionary leadership is instrumental when an organization seeks growth, innovation, and expansion, while caretaking leadership is well-suited for maintaining efficiency and stability. Ideally, organizations benefit from a blend of both styles, where visionary leaders are complemented by caretakers who ensure that the operational foundation remains strong. Developing the ability to balance these styles empowers organizations to navigate both current realities and future possibilities effectively.

Faith And Politics

In one of those tooweird-to-be-true-butyet-it-is moments, Kamala Harris just dissed Christians everywhere. In one of her recent rallies, a young man yelled, "Jesus is Lord," causing her to adopt a smarmy look and retort, "Oh, I think you came to the wrong rally." Empowered by the jeering laughter of her supporters she followed with, "I think you meant to go to the smaller rally down the street." The audience howled and guffawed. She looked so proud.

Reality set in as the story went viral. In one fell swoop, Kamala Harris told Christian voters their faith-based political views were not welcome in her camp. Misinterpretation? You decide. I have.

Christians everywhere should take note how their faith is either revered or reviled in politics.

While serving in the State Senate, I frequently sponsored pro-life bills. I recall more than once being accused of the dastardly offense of mixing my faith with my politics. "Say it ain't so Phil! You didn't really act like a Christian in the political realm did you?!" Well, I hope I did!

I was not elected to be less than who I am. I ran as a conservative, a patriot, and an unabashed believer in Christ. If my faith makes me who and what I am, I would be a hypocrite to leave it at home.

Dr. Ben Carson recently headlined the Alabama Policy Institute's annual dinner and included his own thoughts on faith in the public arena. "It is said that there are two things we should never talk about in public: politics and religion. But those are the two things that we must talk about because those are where we are being attacked," Carson said. I would also add that we absolutely, unequivocally, talk about them together: faith AND politics.

Truth and common sense combine to say we must mix our faith with our politics. Vote our faith. Vote with faith. Pray for our candidates. Pray for our governance.

Christians everywhere should unapologetically mix their faith-based values, traditions, and principles with their politics. In the absence of Christian voices in the public arena, the vacuum will be filled by those who believe just the opposite, even by those would mock and remove our ability to live out our Christian worldview.

Christians must care who makes and enforces the laws that govern our country. It's very simple: either we as Christians speak out about our faith, or those who don't believe will speak out about our faith. I would rather it be us than them.

But despite the freedom to do so, a recent study by pollster George Barna determined that, inexplicably, thirty-two million self-identified, churchgoing Christians are expected to sit this election out. For one reason or another, they just won't make it to the polls. Fully 68% of them said it is due to "a lack of interest in politics and elections." It's just not their bag...just doesn't get their attention...just not into it.

Dr. Jeff Myers, president of Summit Ministries, recently opined that it is not about knowing all of the candidates or all of the issues. He gave a very succinct set of principles that Christians can weigh --Constitutional principles like "life, liberty, [and] property," because those "are the three things the Constitution said it's developed in order to provide," Myers said. He elaborated, saying that when a Christian struggles with knowing everything they can at least lean on "...which candidate for any given office is going to be most likely to lessen the evils that occur around life, liberty, and property...That is going to help inform my decision." Myers is right.

It is not about knowing everything about politics. It's about being a good steward of this nation. We have been entrusted with a nation that gives us great freedom, including the freedom of worship. If we as believers abdicate our role as stewards by deferring our right to vote a faith-based worldview, we are no better than the unfaithful servant in Matthew 25 who took the resources given him by his master and buried them in the ground instead of investing them wisely. He just sat on it. He did nothing to advance the cause.

Stewardship of that with which we have been entrusted is not only sought, it is expected. What will we do with this country we have been given? Will Christians take bold action to grow and shepherd it. Will people of faith be good stewards of America? Or will we sit on our haunches and just wait to see what happens? I don't want to be the one who realizes in the end that I squandered an opportunity to advance our nation's capabilities, enhance our strength, and protect life, liberty, and property.

The Christian faith is not based on works. I believe that. Salvation is assured through a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. Yet there are two parts to being a Christian: making him Savior and making him Lord of our lives. Salvation is assured but lordship is our witness. In James 2:18 (NASB) we're told that faith and works go together as the visual reminder to the world that we believe. "But someone may well say, 'You have

faith and I have works; show me your faith without the works, and I will show you my faith by my works."

Voting is works. Sometimes Christians need to be busy being Christians, in real and practical ways.

Faith and politics go together like a hand in a glove. Get up Christians. Get busy, and go to the polls and vote your faith. Vote like your faith depends on it. Your ability to openly practice your faith without fear of loss of life, liberty and property actually does.

those who are paid from sickness or those who are paid for wellness?



You can take control to recognize and free yourself from dangerous situations. We are going to discuss the steps to avoid getting involved with an abuser, and the steps to take if you are already in an abusive environment. I cannot stress enough for either scenario that it is essential to build outside resources, and to

talk with those you trust about what's going on in your relationship. A professional therapist is one of those resources because that person can help you build your self-esteem and learn how to help yourself, without feeling judged or rushed into taking action. If you can't afford individual therapy, learn all you can from books and online resources, join online forums, and find a support group at a local women's shelter. Do these things even if it means keeping them a secret. Your life and your children's lives may depend on it.

The easiest way to avoid getting involved in an abusive relationship is to avoid getting involved with an abuser. I acknowledge that it can be difficult to identify someone who could be abusive. So, I recommend that you beware of someone who:

- 1. Criticizes you or family.
- 2. Is rude to you and others.
- 3. Displays anger outbursts.
- 4. Insists on having his or her way and will not compromise.
- 5. Presents with paranoia.
- 6. Is overly jealous or possessive.
- 7. Threatens you or your family.

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tion. But remember this: An abuser won't risk becoming abusive until he or she knows that you won't leave. The abuser's first step is to win you over and then isolate you from your family and friends. Many times the violence doesn't begin until after the marriage or after the birth of a child, when you are less likely to leave. (But it can also escalate if you try to leave.) This is why it is so

important to have a plan and support.

If you are already in an abusive situation, please don't wait for the next attack. Call the National Domestic Violence Hotline at 1-800-799-SAFE. To prepare for an emergency, you can:

- 1. Have a safe place to go, like a friend or family's home
- 2. Open a bank account or credit card in your own name.
- 3. Let neighbors know to call the police if they hear loud noises or suspect a dangerous situation.
- 4. Make extra car and house keys. Hide a car key outside, so you and your children can get away.
- 5. Have a bag packed with important legal papers and cash. Pack a separate bag with clothes and comfort items for your children.

Remember, you have value and your life matters. Change takes courage.


